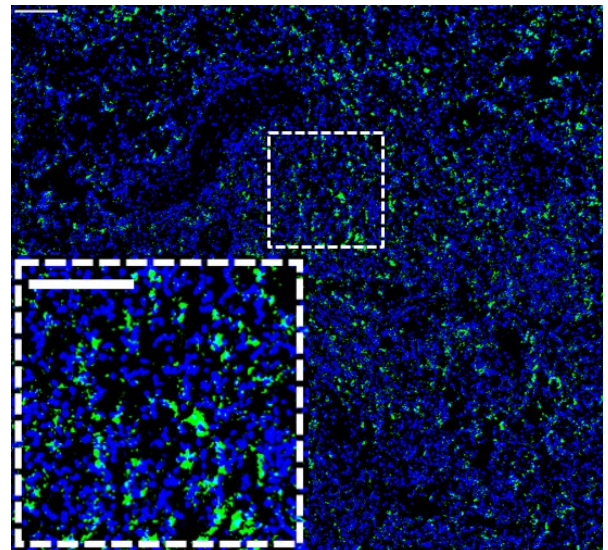
Application: The metal-tagged antibody is designed and formulated for the application of Imaging Mass Cytometry (IMC™) using the Fluidigm Hyperion™ Imaging System on formalin-fixed, paraffin-embedded (FFPE) tissue sections.

Quality control: Each lot of conjugated antibody is quality control-tested by Imaging Mass Cytometry on tissue sections.

Recommended concentration: For optimal performance it is recommended that the antibody be titrated for the desired application. Suggested initial dilution range:
IMC-Paraffin: 1:25 to 1:100

Description

CD11c is a transmembrane glycoprotein also known as integrin αX or CR4. CD11c is primarily expressed on dendritic cells, NK cells, a subset of intestinal intraepithelial lymphocytes (IEL) and some activated T cells. It is associated with hairy cell leukemias, acute nonlymphocytic leukemias, and some B cell chronic lymphocytic leukemias.



Human spleen (FFPE) stained with 154Sm-anti-CD11c (poly) at a dilution of 1:50 (green pseudocolor) and iridium DNA intercalator (blue pseudocolor). Heat-mediated antigen retrieval was performed using Tris/EDTA buffer pH 9. Scale bar size = 100 µm.
